







Cross-Border Family Mediation (CBFM) Training for Ukrainian Mediators

ONLINE via ZOOM

Sunday, 10th-13th September 2023 (Module 1) Wednesday, 9th -11th October 2023 (Module 2)

Almost 8 million Ukrainians have left Ukraine since the start of the full-scale invasion. Most of them are mothers and children. Unfortunately, due to disruptions in family communication, some of these families are faced with the issue of co-parenting while separated by an international border.

What challenges do these parents face? Both from a practical, emotional and legal point of view? How can parents settle their disputes regarding contact, country of residence, the involvement of grandparents and the extended family in the upbringing of children? How can mediation assist parents in resolving these issues amicably and what are the special features of mediating these cases having regard to the particular context and the specific challenges posed by the war?

To find the answers to these questions we would like to invite Ukrainian family mediators, residing in the Ukraine and those residing abroad, to participate in the *Cross-border Family Mediation Training for Ukrainian Mediators*. The 40-hour training course will also cover many other aspects of family mediation between parents separated by a border. It aims to qualify Ukrainian family mediators to mediate cross-border family disputes, including international child abduction, child access and custody cases. The course will cover relevant legal aspects of international family conflicts, including differences in national family law and the 1980 and 1996 Hague Conventions as well as the Voice of the Child in child abduction proceedings and mediation. Participants will get acquainted with the tools and methodologies of mediation in international family disputes with the aim of protecting the best interests of the child. Practical role plays form an integral part of the training.

This course has been specially adapted for the settlement of cross-border disputes between Ukrainian parents, taking into account the specific challenges presented by wartime. Other topics featured in this training include: Parental Alienation and the specifics of Trauma-informed Mediation.

Training Providers:

The training is conducted in partnership by the **Ukrainian Mediation Academy** and MiKK - **International Mediation Center for Family Conflicts and Child Abduction** with co-funding of the **European Union** (EU Co-financed projects CONSENT and ACCORD¹)

- MiKK International Mediation Center for Family Conflicts and Child Abduction, a leading international training provider in the field of international family mediation, and has been conducting such trainings internationally for more than 20 years. The standardised Cross-border Family Mediation (CBFM) Training concept was developed by MiKK in the EU co-funded Training in International Family Mediation (TIM) project in 2010. Over the past years, MiKK has continuously adapted, improved and updated its CBFM training to keep abreast of any changes in the mediation and legal environments and to take into account feedback from international participants. So far, mediators from more than 50 countries have successfully completed the MiKK CBFM training. For this training the MiKK CBFM training concept was modified in parts to allow the integration of specialist modules conducted by expert trainers from the Ukrainian Academy of Mediation so as to address the problems and particular challenges arising for families in times of war.
- <u>The Ukrainian Academy of Mediation (UAM)</u> was established in 2014 and is a leading non-governmental organisation in the field of mediation and ADR. Its mission is to promote the development and dissemination of

mediation and other alternative dispute resolution (ADR) in Ukraine, as well as to increase the level of culture of peace and harmony in Ukrainian society. The UAM implements initiatives aimed at ensuring access to quality mediation services, promoting the harmonisation of Ukrainian legislation on ADR with the legislation of the European Union, facilitating the professional development of mediators, and conducting educational, training and research activities.

TRAINERS:

A team of international trainers from MiKK, UAM and experienced independent trainers, as well as representatives of the judiciary and Central Authorities all of whom are experts in their fields, will conduct this interactive training course, which aims to equip family mediators with the necessary knowledge, skills and tools to mediate complex international family disputes with a particular focus on cross-border disputes involving Ukrainian families.

TERMS OF PARTICIPATION, FEES & PREPARATION

General

- This training is open to certified Ukrainian family mediators only, regardless of their country of residence.
- The number of places is limited. Please apply as soon as possible. If the number of applications exceeds the maximum number of participants, preference will be given to practising family mediators.
- **Registration** for the training will be open **until August 10 2023** (participants will be informed by 17 August 2023 whether or not they have been selected to participate in the training).

Training Course Fee

■ There is **no training fee is payable** for participating in this training, however **in return for participating**, mediators are asked to agree to making themselves available for conducting **two pro-bono mediations** in an international family dispute between Ukrainian parents. To implement this obligation, mediators are kindly requested to register on the <u>mediation-help.com</u> platform mediation-help.com before **September 1st.** After successful conclusion of the *CBFM Training for Ukrainian Mediators*, mediators are obliged to include their offer to conduct 2 free-of-charge mediations to their *Mediation Help* profile (as was agreed as a condition for participating in the training).

Preparation for the Training:

■ Please allow at least 3,5 hours to prepare before the first training session. Preparation will involve: familiarising yourself with the applicable international legal instruments, answering some questions on National Family Law (Ukraine and other countries) and watching a 35-minute film (online). All of this information will be sent to participants in advance.

Certificate & Listing:

- Active participation in at least 90% of the training is required in order to be selected and to receive a certificate.
- In addition to being listed on the Mediation Help Platform, each participant who has successfully concluded the training and has fluent English or German will be able to join the International **MiKK Mediators listing** free-of-charge for two years (until 2025).

KEY DETAILS OF TRAINING:

<u>Training Dates</u>: The training will take place in two parts/modules: 10-13 Sept (4 days) & 9-11 Oct (3 days) 2023. <u>Times</u>: *Please note that that there are shorter training days (11am-3pm) and longer days (11am-5.30pm) as follows:* from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Kyiv time (10 & 12 September, 10 & 11 October);

from 11:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Kyiv time (11 & 13 September; 9 October).

Format: Online (via Zoom)

<u>Training language</u>: English with simultaneous translation into Ukrainian; Some training sessions will be conducted in Ukrainian. Please note that the language of the role plays will be Ukrainian (the role-play sessions will be supported by the Ukrainian trainer team).

Ischtar qualified as a mediator with the Family Mediators Association (FMA) in London and with

Inmedio (Multi-Track Peace Mediation) in Berlin. She trained in Child Inclusive Mediation (CIM) with the FMA. Ischtar has developed content and conducted mediation trainings for MiKK and other institutions such as ERA, EJTN and for EU co-financed projects (LEPCA, VOICE, I-CARE). Ischtar has co-conceived EU co-financed projects for MiKK (i.e. AMICABLE, ACCORD). of the Association of International Family Judges (AIFJ). She runs Europe-wide training courses on cross-border family law. For years she is involved in the training in cooperation in civil matters run by the European Judicial Training Network (EJTN). Her main focus is on strengthening children's rights in cross-border proceedings.

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Olha Zozulia is a lawyer. She is in charge of operations with the international treaties on child protection sphere in the Ministry of Justice of Ukraine.

Her professional skills and knowledge concern the theme of child protection and child abduction, including procedure of mediation in cross-border family disputes, custody issues and scope of the parental responsibility and other legal representatives of the child, applicable law, jurisdiction, procedure of recognition and enforcement.

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Lisa Parkinson

Lisa is a grandmother in family mediation, as well as in her own family. 45 years ago, she co-founded the first family mediation centre in the UK and a few years later, helped to set up the first national association of family mediators with a Code of Practice and training programme. Lisa drew from her experience in mental health social work and family therapy to develop a family systems approach to mediation with separated couples, parents and carers, rather than settlement-seeking mediation focused on adult negotiations without considering the child's right to be heard. Parental conflict harms children's well-being and development, especially where there is litigation and continuing dispute. Together with five family lawyers in London, Lisa launched a pilot project in 1986 to extend mediation from child-related issues to all issues, including finance and property. The Family Mediators Association was founded in 1988 (Lisa was appointed director and

now a Vice-President), providing cross-disciplinary training in co-mediation on all issues. As a founder member of the European Forum on Family Mediation and World Mediation Forum, Lisa has taken part in conferences and given mediation training in many countries including Argentina, Canada, Finland, France, Germany, Italy, Kazakhstan, Morocco, Portugal, Russia, South Africa, Spain, Switzerland, Turkey, Ukraine and the US. The 4th English edition of









her book, Family Mediation, was published in 2020, with seven editions in other languages. Now retired from mediation practice, Lisa continues to give training mainly in child-inclusive mediation (ChiM – children in mediation), so that children and young people can be offered the opportunity to talk with a ChiM-qualified mediator, if they wish, and have their views and suggestions taken into account by their parents. Arrangements agreed within the family work better and last longer than a court order. In 2022 Lisa was delighted to win the National Mediation Significant Achievement Award.

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Magdalena Jańczuk

is Co-CEO of MiKK e.V. International Mediation Centre for Family Conflict and Child Abduction since 2019. She has been working at MiKK since 2014. As co-managing director is responsible for the financial and organisational aspects of the association's work as well as for human resources.

Trained as a mediator and cross-border mediator, she graduated in administration from the Faculty of Administration and Social Sciences at the Warsaw University of Technology (MA).

She has been involved in several EU projects implemented by MiKK at different stages, from planning to implementation (LEPCA II, iCare, ACCORD), as well as being largely responsible for the planning and preparation of the financial plan and implementation of the EU project AMICABLE developed by MiKK, which involved project partners from four EU countries.
