Dear UASAZ board, Dear UASAZ general assembly,

As the elected auditor I have examined the finances of UASAZ for the 2025 calendar year and found everything in order. I have checked that the financial documents match the bank statements, all major receipts, all humanitarian donations and all reimbursement requests. I found everything well documented and no inconsistencies between the various documents.

I have also reviewed the balance between the incoming humanitarian donations collected by UASAZ and the outgoing donations from UASAZ to various Ukrainian NGOs up to the end of 2025. I found these to be in order and am happy to see the UASAZ board putting in significant effort to track these donations and improve the transparency of the donation process. At the moment, these donations are being carried out as bank transfers directly from the UASAZ bank account. This incurs significant banking fees for international transfers. Given the current levels of documentation of the donations, I would be supportive of the board using alternative methods of donation with lower fees.

I have a small recommendation for the planning of the next budget session: I suggest merging all event types into a single budget item. Currently, the event expenses are not tracked separately in the gnucash accounting software and no record is being kept of the split between cultural/charity/recreational elsewhere. Since many events span multiple categories and there is currently no need to have this split (all events are being organised by the same team of people) it would be more efficient overall to merge the different event categories into a single budget item.

I would like to congratulate the UASAZ board on another successful year and the Treasurer Kseniia Shcherbak on a job well done. I recommend the general assembly approves the financial reports for 2025 and releases the board from their obligations.
