



Just and Green Urban Recovery Accelerator (JGURA)


A planning tool that focuses urban development on sustainable mobility, ecology and balanced use of resources.

Economic transformation: from mono to multi






Before the war

- Small and medium-sized businesses had a limited role

Today

- SMEs have become the backbone of the economy
- Industry remains important but not dominant

SME development

Diversification of the economy, creation of new jobs, support for entrepreneurship, expansion of the community's tax base.



Labour market and education

Development of vocational education, retraining, training centres, youth programmes and adaptation of veterans.



Energy security

Installation of solar energy, construction of shelters, provision of heating points, restoration of infrastructure.





Digitalisation of services, assistance to veterans, support for low-income families.




Diversification of the economy
