SURVEY RESPONSES

The **online survey** was administered between Oct. 15, 2024 and Dec. 24, 2024. NFTA received **522 responses**, with the majority of respondents being from ZIP codes 14215, 14214, 14211,14206, 14220, 14213, 14305, and 14226.

TRANSIT

Prior studies recommended locations for BRT stations based on various criteria. NFTA reviewed transit data from Spring 2024 to confirm those proposed stations still had:

High ridership

Multiple transfer opportunities

Ideal BRT stations are also located near key destinations (job centers, schools, shopping, etc.) and are spaced further apart than local bus stops for time savings.



BAILEY AVE BRT

TRAFFIC SAFETY

The project aims to improve **safety for all** travelers in the corridor. A review of crash data (2018-2023) identified priority locations with criteria:

- Signalized intersections, and
- Proposed BRT station, and
- More than one fatal or serious injury crash

The seven (7) priority locations were also identified by the Greater Buffalo-Niagara Regional Transportation Council as part of their federallyfunded Safe Streets for All project. NFTA will work with the City of Buffalo to improve safety at these intersections.

ABOUT THE PROJECT

Based on previous planning and community feedback, NFTA knew that infrastructure improvements should be part of the Bailey Ave BRT project. To inform concept development a corridor assessment was conducted to survey:

Using that information, NFTA will work with the City of Buffalo to make upgrades where possible.
