Comment:

When working on an installation employees need to be aware of the general hazards present.

The installation area is to have been made clear and good access provided by the Client before employees arrive on site for the installation.

Asbestos is highly dangerous. Any asbestos-containing materials in the area should have been identified before work starts.

In terms of manual handling loads will if practicable be dismantled into smaller pieces and two-person handling is used when the load is too heavy or awkward for one person. Employees will be made aware of safe lifting technique and will follow correct manual handling procedure and have been instructed not to attempt to lift beyond their capabilities.

If deemed appropriate the site erection area will be suitably cordoned off whilst the task is undertaken to avoid possible injury to others.

With the installation of the entertainment equipment only battery powered tools will be used and employees will wear such personal protection equipment as deemed necessary e.g. safety footwear.

Fire extinguishers should be made available and employees need to be aware of their location and of the evacuation procedure.

HAZARD	EXISTING SAFETY MEASURES	FURTHER ADVISORY MEASURES
Injury caused by stall or equipment tipping over	Ensure units are strapped together and set up by a trained operator. If possible outside on grass units should be staked down.	Extra precaution, checks and strapping in windy conditions. If weather is too extreme, operator has the right to stop the stall activities.
Stall collapsing	All sides and tops are Vecteded securely on and strapped together with toggles. Steel work should be slotted in together.	Extra precaution, checks and strapping in windy conditions. If weather is too extreme, operator has the right to stop the stall activities.
Guests or operator being hit by activities – dependant on stall	All guests must throw/shoot from behind the bunted area. The operator will stand to the side of the activity and manages the queue to ensure no one is in a dangerous position. Operator will instruct the player on where to throw. Players are advised that most games are tests of accuracy, not strength.	With prior notice of large numbers attending the event additional trained operators can be supplied at an extra fee.
Guests being injured by falling over barriers	Operator has good queue management and recognises unruly behaviour.	With prior notice of large numbers attending the event additional trained operators can be supplied at an extra fee.
Operator may suffer strains or bruises from carrying heavy / bulky objects	Loads are kept light and small. If the equipment is too heavy for one person a second employee will be provided to help set up the stall.	

HAZARD	EXISTING SAFETY MEASURES	FURTHER ADVISORY MEASURES
Over enthusiastic participants	Responsible person supervising at all times. Operator holds the right to refuse service to players who seem a risk to themselves , others or the equipment.	With prior notice of large numbers attending the event additional trained operators can be supplied at an extra fee.
Tripping over anchorage points, spare equipment or electrical cables.	Anchor points used per manufacturer's instructions and highlighted with warning tape. Where possible electrical cables and wires will not cross public walkways, Equipment must not block public walkways or fire exits.	In the event of large numbers of participants attending or large events additional safety fencing can be erected with prior notice.
Injury through lack of supervision	A fully trained operator must be present at all times.	
Danger of unnecessary injury	Ensure that no one uses the equipment who is showing signs of suffering the effects of alcohol or drugs. If the participant appears unwell or has a physical disability then the operator has the right to refuse that person if they consider there is a significant risk.	Take due care and attention if the participant is pregnant especially if the activity can harm the unborn child. A supervising adult may need to undertake a check to ensure that it is safe for the participant to take part.
