

## Cannibalism in the Old Testament

The Old Testament mentions instances of cannibalism, though it is not explicitly condoned or encouraged. Passages in books like 2 Kings, Lamentations, and Leviticus describe such events, typically as a consequence of famine and siege, or as a punishment for disobedience.
